Example of a Facilitated Community Conversation: Condah Western District of Victoria

| | Step | Explanation |
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| 1 | Determine your area of investigation | In 1914 Condah was a vibrant agricultural community. Many men enlisted including a significant number of indigenous recruits from the Lake Condah Mission. What was the experience of this community during the war for the families of the enlisted men and the women and children at home? Can we uncover stories of how individuals and their families coped during the war? If we hold the conversation what will the community find relevant from this wartime experience today? What's happened to the honour roll that was once in the Condah Hall? Can it be located or replaced? (Nearby Wallacedale also missing) |
| 2 | Identify a local community | Condah and Lake Condah Condah (3303) is located in southwestern Victoria 285 km from Melbourne. In the 2011 Census the population was 418 comprised of 47.1% females and 52.9% males. 2.6% are Indigenous. Many of the families who lived in Condah in 1914 have descendants living in nearby towns of Heywood, Hamilton, Branxholme, Portland and Macarthur. |
| 3 | Undertake some preliminary research on the community | At least 20 men from Condah enlisted. 4 members of the Lovett family enlisted from the Lake Condah Mission (service records National Archives) At least seven men were killed including local Condah identity and part time poet Norman 'Scotty' McLeod. He wrote poems that appeared in Hamilton Spectator. Charles Lea an accomplished pianist from nearby Wallacedale was killed at Gallipoli landing in 1915. |
| 4 | Make a list of potential interested individuals and community groups | RSLs: Heywood, Hamilton, Macarthur Heywood Secondary College, Heywood Consolidated School Gunditjmara people through Damien Bell Glenelg Shire Condah Progress Association Peter Bakker, Hamilton historian who researched the contribution of indigenous Australians in past conflicts |

| 11 | Hold the conversation | My ideas for the Condah conversation are (can be shaped by organising committee): Part 1: Have descendants of some of the WW1enlistees tell their ancestors' stories. RSL open event Damien Bell and his family to tell of the 4 Lovett brothers who enlisted from the Condah Mission. How does the family feel about this? Ian McLeod (83) tells story of Donny McLeod who returned with one eye after suffering multiple GSW. He was lan's favourite uncle. Maryanne Martin tells story of her grandmother Susie McLeod who had her fiancée, eldest brother, and 4 first cousins at the war. Her eldest brother killed in action. Read Norman McLeod's poems. Identify other local residents to tell another story Produce booklet for each participant with history of Condah 1914 – 1918 and get some one to talk about this. Will have pictures as well as stories Part 2 – draft focus questions What stands out about the Condah community's experience of WW1? What's similar to living here today? What's different? Is there anything to learn from the people who lived at this time? If you could bring someone from that time to the room now, who would it be and what would you ask them? Why is this important to you? |
